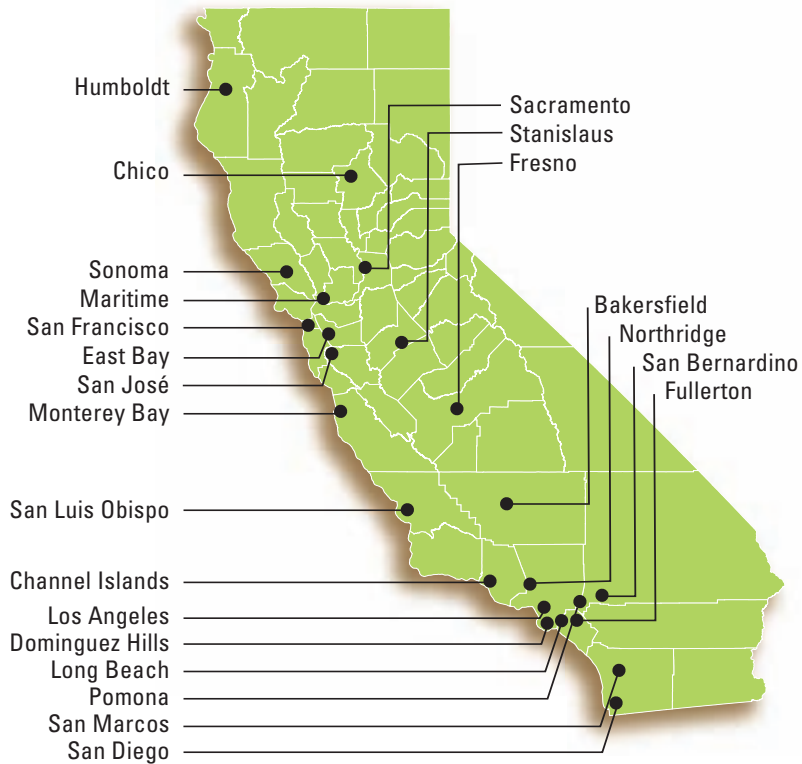


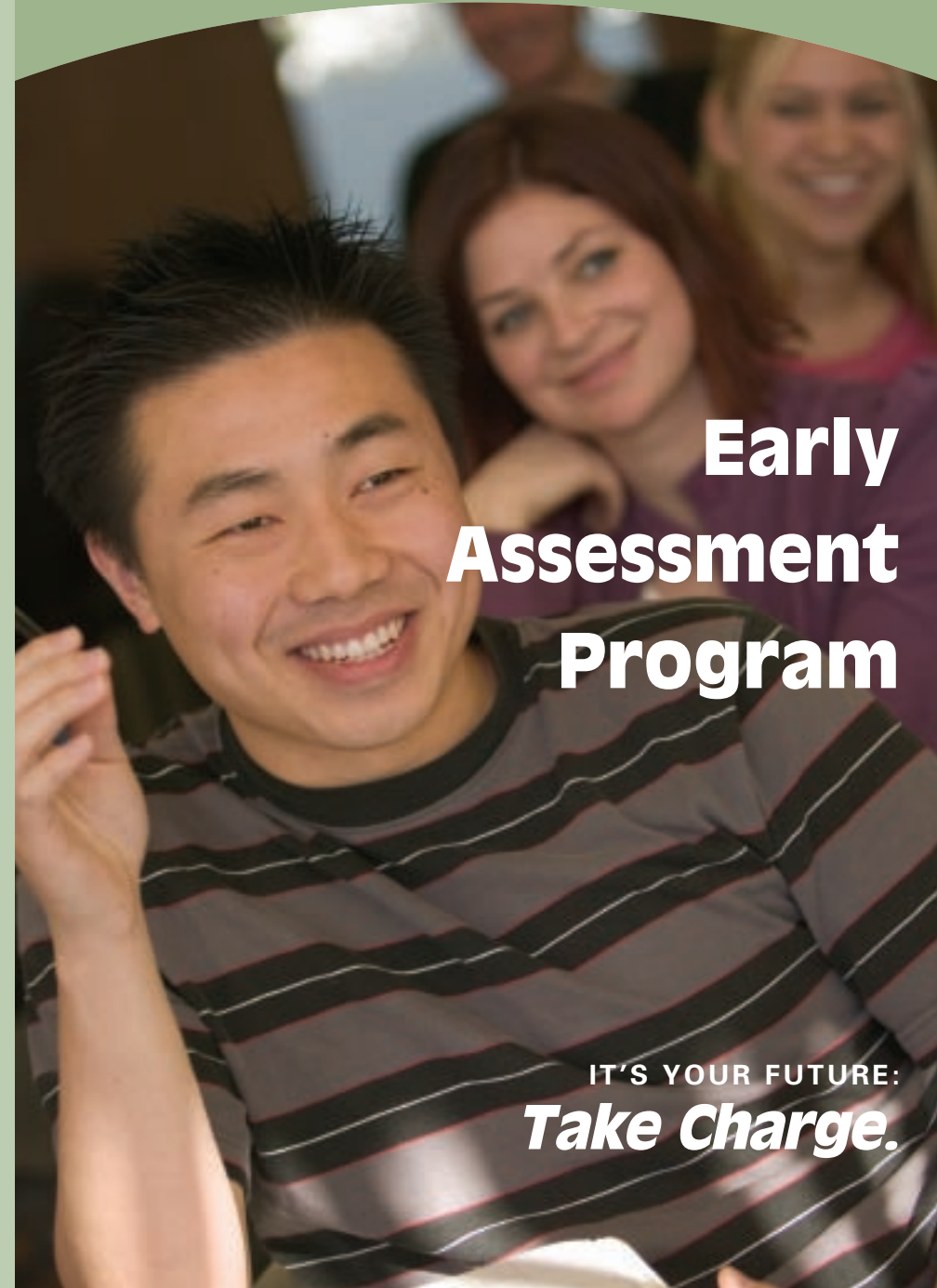

What is the Early Assessment Program?

The Early Assessment Program is an academic preparation program to help high school students meet college readiness standards in English-language arts and mathematics before admission to a CSU campus.

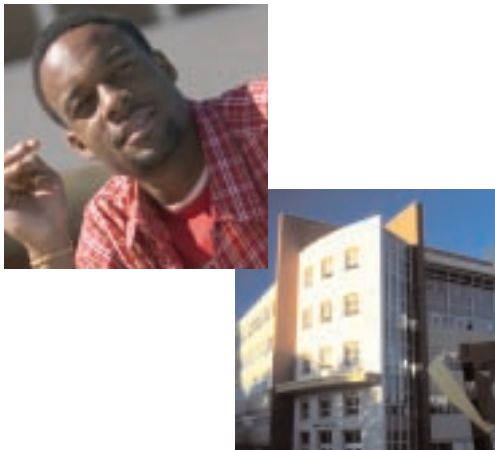
How will I benefit from the EAP?

Eleventh grade students may be able to do the following:

- Skip the required CSU English and/or mathematics placement tests
- Identify the need for additional preparation to succeed at the CSU
- Adjust senior-year coursework to prepare for the CSU
- Stop wasting time and money in college remediation courses that do not count toward a bachelor's degree

How will the CSU know if I'm college ready?

Before the beginning of your senior year, you and your high school will receive a report indicating your readiness for college-level English-language arts and mathematics. This report will be shared with the CSU if you "bubble in" the section in each exam that indicates that you want your EAP results released to the California State University.



It's easy to participate in the program!

The optional EAP college readiness exams are administered during the spring semester of the 11th grade as part of the required California Standards Tests (CSTs). These exams include:

- Early Assessment of Readiness for College English (15 additional items and a 45-minute essay)
- Early Assessment of Readiness for College Mathematics (15 additional items)

Eleventh grade students will be notified of their schools' testing dates in early spring.

Preparation is key!

Students who receive exemptions from CSU placement tests in English-language arts and/or mathematics can enroll in college-level coursework without having to take remedial classes. Students who haven't received these exemptions must take a more serious approach to their senior year coursework. In both cases, students will enter a university better prepared for their collegiate studies.

Please consider completing the Early Assessment college readiness exams. The EAP can be very helpful to you and the university in making plans for your higher education.
